"Five Things We Can Do to Make Our Church Safer"

(Reference: brotherhoodmutual.com. "Ten Easy Ways To Create a Safer Church This Sunday; 9/17/19.)

- 1. Invest in two-way radios.
- 2. Remind the congregation of various exits in case of an emergency
- 3. Identify trained professionals already in our congregation, such as nurses, police officers, doctors.
- 4. Invite local law enforcement and other professionals to come and identify "trouble spots" or weak areas in our specific building.
- 5. Research to see what other area churches are doing.

How many of these steps have we already taken? We need more people on the church security team. Signing up does not mean you will be in a line of fire! Security includes fire drills, lost children senarios, or health emergency situations, as well as intruder scenarios. You can help in a variety of ways to make our church a safer place. Can you make phone calls? Can you visit other churches and talk to them about security? Can you do research?. Can you help with the technology needed? Can you write a report? Can you see that all entrances are free and clear? Can you give CPR? There are many ways to help. Since Old Testament times, people have protected their temple and their people inside. See 1 Chronicles 26. We may be calling on you to help. Please say "Yes, Lord, Send me."

On August 25th, the last day of his 10-day visit to the area to promote his new CD "Renaissance Renewed", Alfredo Bouza made a stop at Second Baptist, It was important for him to visit the church he held so dear. Alfredo began his music career as a young adult, classically trained in piano in his native country, Cuba. Soon he moved with his family to the USA where he obtained his certification in classical piano and music theory at the Piano Guild of the American College of Music. After starting a family of his own, he, his wife and two little daughters landed in an apartment on Main Street in Moorestown. While taking a walk in the neighborhood on June 11th, 2011, Alfredo heard beautiful singing. He followed the sound right to our church! He entered and sat in the back, When the service was over, he introduced himself to Brother Frisby, our minister of music. Soon Alfredo was playing the piano and Brother Frisby was singing! One month later Alfredo had a position playing at Second Baptist. He served as a musician on staff from that point on until the summer of 2013. Pictured here with Deaconess Mims after a church service. Brother Jamison Williams, has his eyes closed, but his ears and mind are open to the love she imparts! This article is an important alert to parents of school age children, especially boys who are very active in sports. In 1993, our son was playing on the Moorestown Soccer team, the William Allen Middle School soccer team, and the travelling team! He was known for his speed and agility. What we did not know was that at age 13, he would drop dead in his tracks. It happened on the soccer field, but it could have occurred anywhere. Although we never received a diagnosis from Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, we would years later learn he was one of many young boys who suddenly, and often without warning, drop and die. He had hypertrophic cardiomyopathy (HCM). Today, doctors identify and treat this condition. They did not back then. God used my husband and a nurse who were present to bring him back to life that Palm Sunday. (continued on next page)



(continued from p. 9) His heart was restarted, but his airway was blocked. Jamison's condition is a result of lack of oxygen to his brain for about twenty minutes. We are so thankful to God that he survived, but of course now all our lives have taken a new course. We just want to **alert all parents and guardians** to make sure you get a **full and complete** "Back to School Checkup" and if you fall into this described category of a very active young male, get a cardiac checkup as well. We know three young, black males that died from this condition! Today they may prescribe medication or even a transplant if they find problems. THE MORE YOU KNOW...
